FIVE UNITS WITH A 16-FIREFIGHTER DAILY COMPLEMENT

FMB Fire combines fire suppression and fire-based ambulance service in one coordinated response force. Each apparatus silhouette is aligned with its assigned staffing.

THE BOTTOM LINE

FORT MYERS BEACH LOSES THE RIGHT TO RUN FIRE-BASED AMBULANCES

Rescue 31 and Rescue 33 would be eliminated, and the four firefighters assigned to those ambulances would no longer be funded.

Truck 31, Engine 32, and Engine 33 would remain in the fire response force.

ACCESS TO SERVICES AFTER A MERGER

WHAT IT MEANS FOR FORT MYERS BEACH

Today, permitting, inspections, and administration are available on Fort Myers Beach. With a merger, those services would move to two mainland locations.

WHAT THE FUTURE COULD MEAN FOR FORT MYERS BEACH

As Fort Myers Beach rebuilds from Hurricane Ian and new construction adds taxable value, FMB Fire is projecting a continued downward millage trend without a merger.

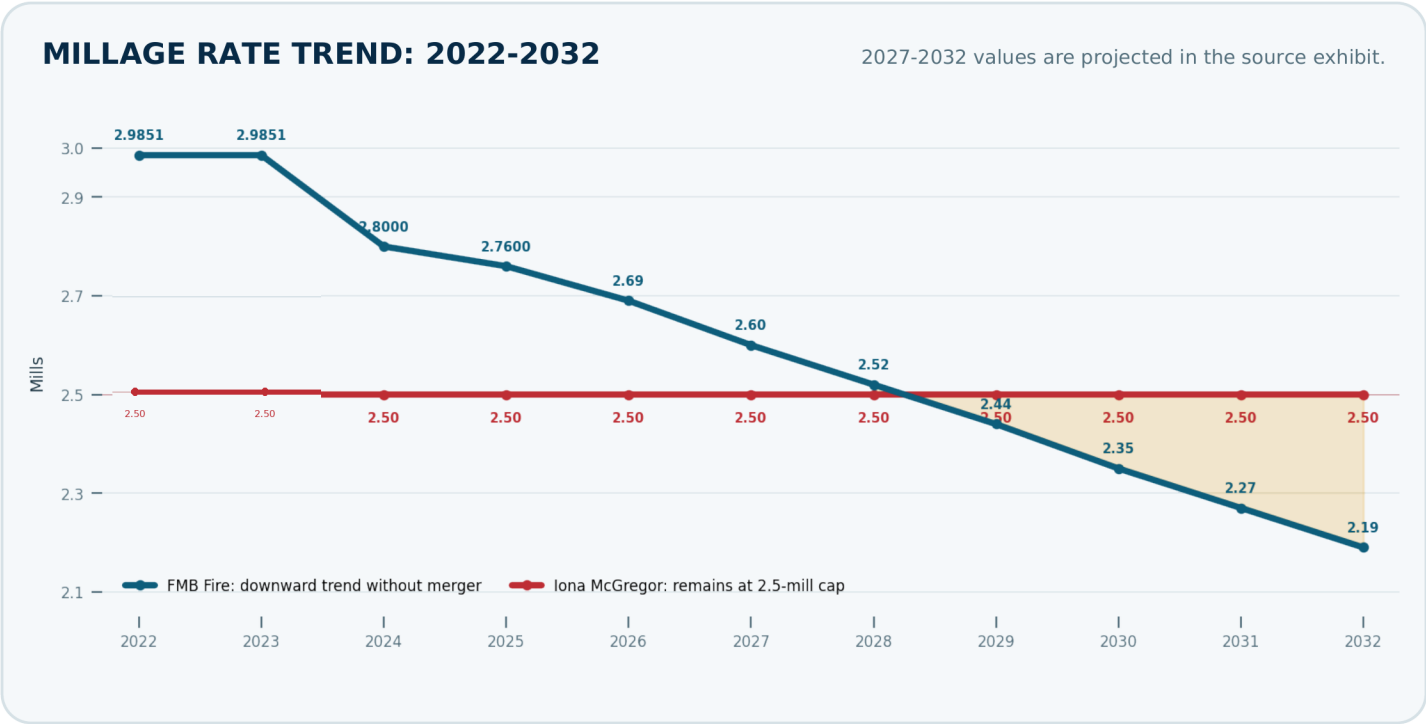
DOWNWARD TREND

Island rebuilding adds new construction.
Total taxable property value is expected to grow.
Lower future millage rates are projected.

AT THE 2.5-MILL CAP

Taxable property values are declining.
Operating costs are increasing.
The millage rate is expected to remain capped.

FMB FIRE IS POSITIONED FOR
LOWER MILLAGE RATES

Iona McGregor is already at its millage cap and is expected to remain there
as taxable values decline and operating costs increase.

Years of careful budgeting built four dedicated savings accounts to protect emergency service, replace essential equipment, and deliver major community projects.
